escalation. The remarks were made by Asif Ghafoor, the Director General of Pakistan Army's media wing Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), to CNN.

Tensions between the two neighbours heightened following the February 14 Kashmir suicide bombing that killed 40 CRPF troopers which was claimed by the Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM). India retaliated by bombing JeM's biggest training camp in Balakot, Pakistan.

He added that troops had been increased on the border with India "because it is natural as part of military planning. When the situation gets hot there are safeguards. Those safeguards are in place on both sides".

In another development, a dossier submitted by India lacks "concrete evidence" linking Pakistan with the suicide bombing, Islamabad said on Tuesday

Pakistan, however, arrested the brother and son of JeM chief Maulana Masood Azhar and 42 others as part of a crackdown on Islamist groups following intense diplomatic pressure.

The brother, Mufti Abdur Rauf,

and Hammad Azhar, a son of the now reportedly ailing Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM) chief, were among those whose names were mentioned in the dossier India handed over to Pakistan last week, Minister of State for Interior Shehryar Khan Afridi said.

But Interior Ministry Secretary Azam Suleman Khan quickly added: "It does not mean that action is being taken against only those individuals who are men-

tioned in the dossier.

"If we have to take over any (organization's) assets, we will do so. Assets can be taken over of organisations already declared as proscribed, under the Anti Terrorism Act, 1997. "If we obtain any further evidence or if we have to investigate any organisation, the government can take any organisation into custody at any time."

The crackdown came a day after the Pakistan government

issued an order to streamline a process for the implementation of sanctions against individuals and entities of all banned outfits as designated by the UN Security Council "In the first phase of our action we have taken 44 people into protective custody. We won't let anyone use Pakistani soil against anyone so that no force can intervene in Pakistan's domestic issues," Afridi said.

The government also froze bank accounts and assets of the organisations banned by UN.

In New Delhi, Conflicting reports about the extent of damage caused by the bombing emerged with a foreign news agency claiming that it has evidence of no damage to the JeM facility. India rejected the report as some opposition parties also raised doubt with Union ministers blasting them for challenging the valour of armed forces.

A news channel reported that 80 per cent of the bombs hit the target. Another report said IAF proof includes high resolution satellite images and images produced by Synthetic Aperture Radar (SAR) establishing the lethality of the strike.

Tories Have Already Raised Over \$604,000 In 2019

The dinner comes after Ford's government changed fundraising rules to allow the premier and cabinet ministers to attend such events, something the previous Liberal regime banned in 2017.

The Tories announced in November that they were also raising the fundraising limits for individual donors from \$1,222 to \$1,600 and phasing out taxpayer-funded subsidies to parties.

The Liberals had altered party fundraising rules to ban corporate and union donations and bar legislators from attending fundraisers. The ban on corporate and union donations remains in place.

According to the latest figures available from Elections Ontario,

the Tories are far ahead of their opposition rivals when it comes to fundraising this year. In the first

two months of 2019, Ford's party has raised just over \$604,000. The New Democrats raised over

\$30,000, the Ontario Liberal Party raised \$20,000, and the Green Party raised over \$13,000.

NDP Leader Andrea Horwath said events like Wednesday's gala are what made people angry about the fundraising system before the Liberals changed the rules. "It says to the rest of Ontario, 'we're not going to pay attention to you, we're not going to listen to you, we don't care about you unless you can give us money to help our political party,'" she said.

Green party Leader Mike Schreiner said the gala is a return to cash-for-access events.

"When big money gets a hold on Ontario politics it's bad for democracy and it (doesn't) make people feel like government is there for everyone," he said.

Interim Liberal leader John Fraser said the public must have confidence that the people who purchase tickets to the gala do not have undue influence on the government. "They're a new government and \$1,250 a ticket is a lot of money, it's too rich," he said. "Maybe for going to fundraisers it should be a different limit. I think people have a genuine concern that certain people get ... access."

One Killed In Jammu Attack; Militant Held

JAMMU: A 17-year-old youth was killed and some 30 others were injured on Thursday when a grenade flung by a militant exploded under a parked passenger bus at Jammu's main bus stand. The attacker was arrested within hours.

Jammu and Kashmir Director General of Police Dilbag Singh told reporters that the police had arrested Yasir Javaid Bhat alias Arhaan of Kulgam district in the Kashmir Valley on charges of throwing the grenade.

Yasir Bhat was said to be aligned with the Hizbul Mujahideen outfit.

The thunderous explosion occurred around 11.50 a.m. when the General Bus Stand, as it is known, was teeming with people.

Inspector General of Police Manish Kumar Sinha said the grenade rolled under the parked bus that was headed to Uttarakhand. The blast also injured passengers in a nearby bus which was set to leave for Amritsar in Punjab.

Sinha said the dead was identified as a 17-year-old male from Uttarakhand. "Four others have suffered critical injuries," the officer said. Witnesses said they first thought the explosion was probably a tyre burst.
